Letter from the **Executive Director**

When I look at the picture below - of the first Hockey 4 Youth group from Marc Garneau Collegiate in 2015 - could I have seen what the road ahead was? Could I have known that we would expand every year and now operate 1 Montreal & 5 Toronto programs in support of almost 200 new Canadian (newcomer) and high-priority youth per season? Could I have foreseen that we would still be around to witness the high school graduation of the newcomer youth pictured below who are originally from Syria, Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Tanzania, Ethiopia and Somalia? Just like a game of hockey, time has moved quickly and we have become a team along side our youth.

Time is an interesting concept. I can remember one of the first times that I stepped onto the ice as a six year old growing up in Vancouver. I remember quite vividly falling and getting back up. I can recall some of the great times I spent with my teammates and coaches and some of the fun games we played in. There were also some challenging times, like the time I fractured my ankle in a game or the times I faced racial taunts. This is part of my hockey story. Being the son of refugee parents, I was fortunate, even though we didn't have the means, to play hockey for 21 years. In addition, I had a great support system around me. Hockey helped me feel included.

When I look at the picture above, I also see it through the lens of time. I remember the time I spent with these young people, the first time each one stepped onto the ice, the elation they felt, the fear they overcame when falling, the perseverance they showed when getting back up and the commitment they made to trying a game that was new to them. They are who I was as a six year old back in Vancouver. No matter how much time has passed, I along with all of the youth pictured in this report and in our program have something in common, "We Are Hockey!"

Letter from the Executive Director

No matter where they go in this world, I have told them that "[they] will always be hockey players." It will give each one of them the opportunity to open doors in the future.

Just as most of our youth received help to arrive in Canada, so our journey parallels theirs. With the help of donors both individual and corporate, partners such as government, other non-profit organizations and charitable foundations, high school teachers, administrators, dedicated volunteers and board members we have been able to support more newcomer and high-priority girls and boys every year. In April 2019, we held our largest year end Hockey Celebration and Tournament. We had 100 youth participate in a day to celebrate their achievements and to meet Hockey 4 Youth students from other Toronto communities. We aim to continue growing, to continue fostering social inclusion on and off the ice and to continue providing youth with an entry point to playing Canada's game of hockey.



We - our youth and I - are forever grateful to YOU for all of your past and future support! To conclude, I've recently rekindled my love for writing poetry and as such, I've written a short poem using "hockey terminology" to sum up how I feel.

Overview: Who We Are

Hockey 4 Youth is a grassroots charitable organization that fosters **social inclusion** for newcomer and high-priority Canadian youth (ages 13-19) through our FREE **ice hockey** and life-skills **T.E.A.C.H.** program.

WHAT IS SOCIAL INCLUSION? The process of improving the terms on which individuals and groups take part in society improving the ability, opportunity, and dignity of those disadvantaged on the basis of their identity (The World Bank).



For newcomer & high-priority youth, social inclusion is a necessary prerequisite to feeling a sense of belonging in their communities. They require a range of programs, services & cultural experiences to connect them to their communities. In order to empower newcomer & high-priority youth to prosper in Canada, Hockey 4 Youth provides them with an opportunity to play ice hockey at **no cost**, in addition to life skills development through our T.E.A.C.H. program.



According to the Institute of Canadian Citizenship, while **71% of newcomer Canadians express a desire to play hockey, only 1% will have the opportunity**. This is due to: • gender, culture & financial barriers • lack of entry point into minor hockey

Since 2015, Hockey 4 Youth has grown to 6 programs between Toronto and Montreal. Our impact data after participation in the program is positive:

Hockey 4 Youth (H4Y): By the Numbers

Since we piloted our program in 2015, Hockey 4 Youth has continued to grow. In business, they call it the start of the hockey stick curve. Here is a brief glimpse into more impact!

295 YOUTH SERVED

Since 2015, H4Y has served newcomer & high-priority youth in 1 Montreal and 5 Toronto high schools.

H4Y newcomer youth represent 25 countries of origin including: Syria, Afghanistan, Brazil, Jamaica, the Philippines and Vietnam!

80% FEEL SOCIALLY INCLUDED

Following participation, 80% of H4Y participants report an increased sense of social inclusion.



H4Y Programs: On The Ice

A cornerstone of Hockey 4 Youth programming is learning how to skate and play ice hockey. We use hockey as the foundation for social inclusion and also focus on:

- A commitment to positive mental and physical health as well as an active lifestyle
- Developing transferable skills such as teamwork, collaboration and self-confidence
- Building a sense of community, camaraderie and inclusiveness

These outcomes align with the T.E.A.C.H. program vertical of Healthy, Active Living.





Our Program Model

Hockey 4 Youth provides an 18 week on-ice program that operates from October to April. H4Y provides all equipment on loan to students at no cost and recruits volunteers (including university level hockey players) to coach. At the end of the season, all Hockey 4 Youth students participate in a mini hockey tournament and celebration. We recognize our youth by handing out medals and the prestigious Willie O'Ree Awards for perseverance and a commitment to health, school and hockey.

H4Y Programs: Off The Ice

Newcomer and high-priority youth can often be at a disadvantage due to their limited social network, language deficits, financial barriers and lack of access to career & education pathway planning. As such, H4Y offers the **cost-free** T.E.A.C.H. program which emphasizes skill development and enables students to maximize their potential and overcome barriers. We focus on 5 verticals:



Each component is a personal development opportunity for our H4Y students. They are designed to prepare them for future education and employment choices. Here is a snapshot of the incredible experiential learning opportunities Hockey 4 Youth has offered to our youth.




JR-ECONOMIC CLUB

In September 2016, three Hockey 4 Youth newcomer youth (Faustin from Tanzania, Srinidhi from India and Aya from the Middle East) spoke about their introduction to hockey and the impact it had on them. They were able to share their stories in the presence of 100 people including NHL Commissioner, Gary Bettman, NHLPA Executive Director, Donald Fehr, and Head of adidas Hockey, Dan Near.

Since 2016, the Junior Economic Club of Canada has provided **financial literacy training** through their **Day on Bay program**. To date, **125** youth in Toronto have participated in this program.

H4Y Programs: Off The Ice

Slalom Consulting has been a supporter of Hockey 4 Youth since early 2018. As part of their "Hackathon for Good," employees pitched a hockey app that could serve as an all in one tool for students. A panel of Slalom clients selected the app idea as the winner. Slalom held their first giveback through The Hour of Code where our youth got a chance to learn how to code, create games and tour the Slalom office.





Javeria (from Pakistan) & Fadila (from Syria) attended the Hockey is Her event by She's 4 Sports at the Hockey Hall of Fame.



They got a chance to meet NHL Executive Vice President Kim Davis and hear from an all-female panel consisting of players, coaches and hockey executives. They also met legendary hockey broadcaster Ron MacLean who said: "You become a Canadian citizen twice; once when you get your citizenship and the second time when you learn how to play hockey."

Since 2016, Hockey 4 Youth students have been encouraged to share their personal stories with us, at events and with the media. Our Executive Director, who is media trained, has provided support to all youth who have spoken with media. H4Y has been covered on CTV News Toronto & CTV News Channel, CBC News & CBC Radio in Toronto, Global News Toronto, Metroland Media, City News Toronto and Radio Canada in Montreal.





The success of Hockey 4 Youth is due to the incredible support of our donors, from personal to corporate, to charitable foundation partners. Together, our donors have enabled H4Y to:

- Foster social inclusion for our newcomer & high-priority girls and boys
- Provide new equipment on loan to our newcomer youth
- Rent ice time after school for hockey practices and for our year end tournament
- Offer impactful (and sometimes once in a lifetime) experiential learning opportunities
- Continue growing and supporting more newcomer & high-priority youth

Cassandra Andrade-Arezes

In honour of her late father Henry Andrade, Cassandra & her fiancé Daniel, chose to make a donation to Hockey 4 Youth on their wedding day. A hockey coach for many years, Mr. Andrade was extremely proud of his family, hockey and the Leafs. We are so grateful to the Andrade-Arezes family for choosing Hockey 4 Youth in honour of such a wonderful man, father and hockey fan.

In 2018, with the support of The Calgary Foundation's Daryl K. Seaman Canadian Hockey Fund, Hockey 4 Youth was able to expand to a fifth neighbourhood (Rexdale) in the northwest part of Toronto. The legacy of Mr. Seaman, who was the original owner of the Calgary Flames, lives through this fund, in which amateur sports initiatives across Canada are supported.

1,800 MINUTES PER YEAR




The Financials

Below is an overview of Hockey 4 Youth revenues and expenses from inception through July 31, 2018. Due to a change in our fiscal year, reporting on financial information will now be from August 1st to July 31st. Most of our revenue is spent on program costs such as ice time, hockey equipment, transportation and experiential learning field trips (T.E.A.C.H. program).

Where do we **SKATE** from here? A note from Moezine Hasham:

Since our pilot season in 2015, we have grown rapidly. To use a hockey analogy, I feel like we are still in the **first period**. Hockey 4 Youth will continue operating five programs in Toronto and one program in Montreal. This puts our enrolment for the 2019 - 2020 season at almost 200 girls and boys.

Will Hockey 4 Youth grow to serve another city? That's our goal and it *may* happen in the 2019 - 2020 season! Will we grow our staff beyond one full time person? Since Hockey 4 Youth can't continue to grow programming without dedicated support, this is our intention for the near future.

Will we create a new generation of socially included adults who love hockey?

This certainly has been the case so far. As I said in my "Letter from the Executive Director," no matter where our youth go in the world, they will always be hockey players!

How do we get to the second period?

We need your continued support! We need you as our teammates so that you can "assist" our youth in scoring more "goals"!
